### **ADMISSIONS**

This alternative prospectus will focus on life at Queens', not really admissions. We would encourage all students to consider applying to top universities like Cambridge and know that Queens' warmly welcomes applicants from all backgrounds. There are some links at the end of this document that should explain the admissions process.

### **TERMINOLOGY**

**Buttery** = The food hall, so the cafeteria basically. It's called 'Hall' in some colleges.

**Plodge** = Porter's Lodge, the main entrance to a college.

**Formal** = Three-course formal dinners in the college which students can book onto.

**Michaelmas** = The first term of the academic year (mainly October & November).

**Lent** = The second term of the academic year (January-March).


**Easter** = The third term of the academic year (April-June).

**JCR** = "Junior Combination Room" = The undergraduate body **or** the JCR Committee, that represents it **or** the JCR Common Room.

### **QUEENS' OVERVIEW**

Queens' College is a constituent college of the University of Cambridge. It has around 500 undergraduate students (typically 150 a year for years 1-3), as well as nearly as many postgraduates (who live off-site). Queens' offers almost all subjects and consistently performs well academically, without feeling as intense as other colleges.

Its defining features are its centrally-located, compact and architecturally-diverse grounds, straddling the River Cam, with its two sides connected by the 'Mathematical Bridge'. It is also one of the largest colleges by number of students who regards the college to be a sociable and friendly one. Queens' is also known for novel widening participation work (often student-led), its long history (since foundation in 1448) and its famous alumni.



**Not shown above**: Queens' also operates some off-site facilities, including the Owlstone Croft accommodation block (5-10 minutes' cycle away) for postgraduates and some undergraduates, houses for postgraduates, a boathouse and sports grounds.

### **QUEENS' IN CAMBRIDGE**

Queens' is arguably the best-located college, right on the river and on the edge of the busy centre of town. It's midway between the two main cluster of faculties - the Downing and New Museums Sites, and the Sidgwick Site. Whilst West Cambridge is further it is easily accessible by bike. Queens' students don't tend to go out 'for the day' to their department or faculty, as Queens' is so close you can comfortably go back for a long lunch break!

#### How far is Queens' from various places?

Queens' is also on the university bus route that connects West Cambridge to the hospital and train station. It costs a pound for university students.

- Sidgwick Site (humanities/languages faculties) **500m**
- Engineering Department 800m
- Downing Site (sciences faculties mainly teaching) 650m
- Sainsbury's 800m

#### What's Cambridge like as a city?

- Really busy with tourists and day-trippers, especially on weekends and nice days.

centre of town and my faculty building.



### **FOOD & FACILITIES**

On the main site, Queens' facilities include:

- 3 modern conference rooms and several older (and grander) meeting rooms
- 2 squash courts (free to use) and a gym (a weights room and a cardio room)
- The Fitzpatrick Hall (and lecture theatre)
- 2 bookable music practice rooms
- 3 punts and some paddleboards for hire in the summer months

#### Food Options in Queens'

- **The Buttery** serving 3 meals a day during the week, and brunch and dinner on the weekend. There are 3 or 4 meal options for lunch and dinner, discounting soup and jacket potato, and vegetarian and vegan options are always provided. For breakfasts/ brunch there is a wide variety of options from a full english breakfast to continental options. The price of a typical Buttery meal with 1 main and 2 sides is **£3.60**.
- **Self-Catering** Main site rooms have 'gyp rooms' available to students. The quality varies by building, but all will have fridges, hobs, a toaster, microwave, sink and a kettle. Kitchens off the main site will have ovens and more extensive facilities.
- **Bar/Cafe Food** Fixed menu of things like pizzas, burgers and wings. This is usually more of a special treat, or when we want food later.

### The JCR Room

The JCR Room is a common room for students to hang out in on the third floor of the Cripps Building, looking out over the Mathematical Bridge. Some use the space as a more relaxed place to work, but it's designated as an alternative social space to QBar. There's a Television screen for film night and a Wii console, tables and chairs, bean bags, board games (including Queens' Monopoly), computers and a printer.



### **Offsite Sporting Facilities**

Queens' shares a sports ground with other colleges on Barton Road. This site, a 10 minute cycle away, includes a number of tennis courts, football pitches, rugby pitches, lacrosse pitches, cricket squares and netball courts. The University of Cambridge owns a sports centre and grounds for many sports also. There are public swimming pools and climbing walls in Cambridge.



### The Fitzpatrick Hall

The Fitzpatrick Hall is a multipurpose venue in Queens' that acts both as an open hall, and a theatre that seats around 200 people. It's used for badminton, indoor football and dance, and it's been used for ceilidhs, art shows, and student bops (parties). In theatre mode it can be used for lectures, shows, film screenings, and plays.



### **Green Spaces**

Queens' doesn't have vast tidy lawns like in other Cambridge colleges. Instead we have some grass lawns and other secluded green spaces. Among them is the Grove, a forested area on the river in Queens' that members are free to walk through to clear their minds or relax. Opposite the Grove is Erasmus Lawn, a lawn on the river that students flock to during the warmer months to read, relax or socialise.



### The Queens' Bar/Cafe (QBar)

QBar is the college bar in Queens'. The opening hours are 19:00-23:00 most nights, with later closing on weekends/ Friday. As well as drinks, bar food and desserts are served nightly. The bar can also be used to host events such as karaoke and open meetings. The bar has two pool tables, a darts board and a football table, both of which are free to use. During the day, the space is a cafe serving hot drinks, snacks and paninis. It's a popular working space.



### **Formals & Dinners**

Formal dinners are a tradition of Oxford & Cambridge colleges. Students dress up and wear gowns and receive a three-course meal, at about the same price as a meal out. Students can book on to these as often as they like (there's no obligation to go to one). Birthdays or hosting guests are a common excuse to go! In Queens', as well as formals, there are annual black tie dinners that an entire year group or subject group attend, held in the Old Hall.



### **ACCOMMODATION**

Queens' has a mix of old and new accommodation buildings across the college site. The majority of undergrads are house on-site, and are able to choose from a range of options to fit their budget and preferences - students tend to get the room type they want. The college is one of the only ones to have accommodation on both sides of the river, this leads to a split in architectural styles that we call the 'Dark Side' and the 'Light Side'. The Dark Side contains the original buildings of the college with an older architectural style, whereas the Light Side has two of the newer buildings and the modern porter's lodge, as well as most facilities. Accommodation can vary in the following ways:

- **En-suite** vs **shared bathroom** vs **private bathroom** there are a range of bathroom options and this is reflected in price. Private bathroom rooms have their own individual associated bathroom, it just is not connected to the room.
- **Sets** or **rooms** sets are made up of a couple of rooms typically a bedroom connected to a lounge/study.
- Size and view these can vary considerably and this is reflected in room price.

### <u> Cripps Court</u>

The most recent addition to Queens', Cripps is home to nearly 200 rooms, many college facilities, and a majority of first year students. All rooms in Cripps have either an en-suite or a private bathroom, and there's a few 'penthouse' rooms. Cripps is the most accessible of all of the buildings, with ramps to access ground floor rooms, and two lifts. The lighting in Cripps is also significantly brighter than the lighting in the older buildings.



### **Friars Building**

Friars holds some of the cheapest on-site accommodation, and its on the main site. The building dates to the 1800s and is on the Dark Side. Though the rooms aren't too small, each staircase shares a few bathrooms (1 on the top floor and two on the ground floor). There are sinks in every room and a small gyp room on every one of the four floors. Top floor Friars rooms are sets. Friars is the cheapest option for freshers.



### **Offsite Accommodation**

Owlstone Croft (not pictured) was Queens' main block of offsite accommodation and was used to hold postgraduate and second year students. However, as of 2025 it will be **under redevelopment** for up to three years. During this period students will be in houses on Panton Street, Norwich street and at the Grange Road site (pictured) which has its own small library and garden. These are all ~10-20mins walk from the main site and the JCR will work to foster communities at the external sites



### **Dokett Building**

Dokett is the most confusing building in Queens'. Traditionally, third years occupy its mix of big, comfortable en-suites and smaller rooms with bathrooms shared between 2. While the rooms vary massively in size and view, its more modern gyp rooms and cozy and carpeted interior make it quite different from neighbouring Friars, even though they do look quite similar from the outside!



### **Erasmus Building**

Considered by some to be the ugliest building in Cambridge but loved by others, Erasmus residents benefit from modern gyp rooms and views of the river (and prettier buildings). Built in the 50s and newly rennovated in 2025, all of the rooms in Erasmus are ensuite study bedrooms. The rooms in Erasmus are regarded as "like Cripps but a little better", and are usually taken by second and third year students.



### <u>Fisher Building</u>

The first building to be built on the light side, Fisher is made up of large sets that are on the more expensive side of Queens' accommodation, as they used to be shared rooms. The first three floors of each staircase are made up of en-suite sets, with the attic sets sharing a separate shower room and toilet between the four rooms on the floor. These rooms are occupied by mostly second year students.



### THE SOCIAL LIFE AT QUEENS'

Queens' regards itself to be a sociable college with many activities ran by the JCR, societies and students with a range of social spaces and facilities. The collegate experience enables endless opportunities for organic conversation and the hallways will frequently be alive with conversation. Since most first years are in a single building (Cripps) and all are onsite it is very easy to make friends in freshers week with people that both are and are not your direct neighbours.

#### What are typical evening activities and events students attend?

- College 'bops' (parties, usually themed)
- Society, subject or sports team social events
- Socialising in a friend's room and going out clubbing
- Formals (formal dinners), both in Queens' and at other colleges
- Attending talks, debates and panels held by societies such as the Cambridge Union
- Enjoying a drink and playing pool in QBar in the evening
- Playing board games or on the Wii in the JCR Room
- Bringing food out to eat on the riverside during the summer months
- Cozying under a blanket in a friend's room for a film night
- Playing table tennis or squash on the squash courts
- Lazy punting on the river Cam

#### What are the highlights of the year?

The **Queens' May Ball** is a biennial black tie event (in June, confusingly) where the college is transformed into a party lasting until 5 or 6 a.m. the next morning. There will typically be fairground rides, a range of foods and drink, headline acts and varied activities.

Every year after exams the JCR events team (QEnts) host **Bounce**, a garden party with food and drink on the college's riverside Erasmus Lawn. There's food, drinks and musical acts, but the highlight is all the bouncy castles and obstacle courses.

#### What's Cambridge like for shops, venues and clubbing?

Cambridge is a city and has everything you would expect: cinemas, a bowling alley, musical venues and all typical restaurant chains and high street shops. It isn't well known for its clubs. Still, there are four nightclubs in Cambridge, and other venues also host regular nights out. Plenty of students are into their clubbing and will go multiple times a week



### **SPORTS & SOCIETIES IN QUEENS'**

Cambridge should never just be about the workload, and one of the best things about Queens' is the close to 40 student-run sports and societies across the college. As well as being a great opportunity to get active and have fun, it's a fantastic way to meet people from around Queens'. All our sports and societies are beginner-friendly and welcoming, and with sports ranging from Football and Rowing to Paddleboarding and Ultimate Frisbee, societies like Film, Feminism or Chess, as well as a wide range of subject societies, there's something for everyone to get involved in!

BATS host socials, organise theatre trips and put on shows in our very own Fitzpatrick Hall throughout the year.

Most food halls in Cambridge require you to keep your tray on a rack after eating. Queens' is special and has a conveyor belt! Queens' was founded twice by a queen of England (Margaret of Anjou in 1448, and again by Elizabeth Woodville in 1465) hence Queens' and not Queens or Queen's. Queens' is well-known for its brunch, a cheap meal on weekend mornings with all the breakfast classics. "Two hash browns is one item" is the Queens' motto!

Queens', like many colleges, has a TV and Wii in its JCR common room. What's unique in the Queens' JCR Room is 6metres of cactus garden with over 80 plants! Buttery and most formals occur in the large, modern Cripps Hall.
Queens' also has Old Hall, a grand hall with painted ceilings that once featured in a Bastille music video.

Nobody is allowed to walk on most of the grass in Queens', though in the Summer you can relax, sunbathe and eat on the riverside. There's even an annual bouncy castle party after exams on them!

### WELFARE

The transition to university can be a difficult and trying time for all students but this can be especially concerning for students coming to Cambridge with its reputation for intense workloads. However, there are multiple avenues of <u>welfare support</u> from the college, university and JCR:

- **Welfare Team** Queens' has a dedicated team of welfare advisers and mental health specialists on hand to support students both in terms of responding to student concerns and incidents, and pro-actively ensuring students' conditions are catered for in aspects of college life. Head of Welfare: **Rev. Tim Harding.**
- **College Nurse** Queens' has a registered nurse who can treat minor injuries and advise on physical wellbeing generally.
- **Tutors** tutors are fellows (academics) of the college who are a contact for your non- academic wellbeing. They support students experiencing financial hardship, support applications and support or who are having difficulty studying.
- **The Chaplain** the college chaplain is available to advise students on welfare and spiritual issues and not just if you're a christian!
- University Counselling Service a service available to all Cambridge students.
- **Porters** the porters are available 24/7 to provide support with wellbeing concerns.
- **Animals!** we have a variety of furry friends around college, including Tally, our official welfare dog (second left)!

#### **JCR Welfare Officers and Representatives**

Queens' Welfare Officers organise events for students to provide supportive and calming places to relax, do arts and crafts work, enjoy tea and cakes, or even spend time with dog Tally! Free sanitary and sexual health products are provided by the JCR in toilets and laundry rooms and welfare talks are held in freshers week



### DISABILITIES SUPPORT AND EXAM ADJUSTMENTS

Disabilities include mental health conditions, autism spectrum conditions, specific learning difficulties, physical impairments and long-standing conditions. Disabilities can make Uni life more challenging and you are entitled to reasonable adjustments and support from both Queens' and Cambridge University. There are a range of options to access support and get exam adjustments below.

#### **CUSU Disabled Students Campaign**

Exists to represents and campaign for the rights of disabled students at Cambridge. There are also various Facebook groups for those with different conditions at Cambridge to build communities.

#### AccessAble

Provides guides on the accessibility of individual buildings on each site.

### THE ADRC

The Access and Disability Resource Centre is the main port of call for most Disabled students. They offer advice (such as around navigating your studies and funding), support and ensure legal requirements for disabled students are met. The ADRC make SSDs and recommendations for EEAs. The ADRC is also there for students who might be facing new difficulties during their studies, they also provide a neurodiversity screening service.

#### What is an EEA?

Exam Access Arrangements are another term for exam support which can include various adjustments such as rest breaks, use of a computer and assistive technology. They can be applied for on the ADRC website and are included in SSDs.

#### What is an SSD?

Student Support Documents are a summary of recommendations on supporting and teaching a disabled student. They are mainly used when a students reasonable adjustments are required in multiple areas. They are specific to Cambridge for communicating reasonable adjustments and are personalised for each student within their college and subject. SSDs are sent to college and it is their responsibility to distribute recommendations to relevant college staff and faculty. They can be applied for through the ADRC who will access needs and evidence, building recommendations off them.

  - Organization of the college storage room where you can leave your belongings during the holidays to facilitate your return back home.
  - An international freshers' guide to tell you all you need to know and prepare for before coming to Cambridge (and England in general)
- A great support team with people to talk to if you feel homesick, and that will really help facilitate your transition to living abroad
- Communication with different international societies that you can get involved with to keep your cultural ties (https://www.societies.cam.ac.uk/)

### FINANCE AND COST OF LIVING

Whilst the financial burden of university (especially for Oxbridge) is a major concern on prospective students minds there is a very significant amount of financial support available from Queens' and Cambridge University as they have significant financial resources to spend on students compared to other institutions

UK students can apply for a student maintenance loan to cover living costs, with more money available for students on lower households income. Almost all UK Queens' students will have student loans.

Queens' students are eligible to automatically receive the 'Cambridge Bursary', which offers £3500/year to students in households earning £25,000 or less, with a linear tail-off to zero at around £62,000 [as of 2025-26]. An enhanced bursary rising to £5600 in total is offered to students qualifying for Cambridge Bursary and classified as "independent" by the SLC (such as estranged students or those exiting care) as well as to students on year 4, 5 and 6 of Medicine or Vet Med courses. Ontop of this an additional £1000 per year is offered to students on free school meals through the "Education Premium". Queens' students can also receive funds to deal with financial hardship through their tutor.

Cambridge does not reccomend students hold jobs during term time and your DoS or Tutor may not permit you to work during term time and this is part of the reason why the Cambridge Bursary scheme is provided. However, students should note that Cambridge terms only last for 8 weeks compared to 10-12 at other universities reducing the total cost of studying and providing ample opportunity to work in vacations. There will also still be opportunities to do some paid work for the university such as working as a Queens' student ambassador or working for other outreach schemes organised by departments. Lastly, some students are still able to work in jobs like tutoring with permission from their DoS/Tutor.

### **ADDITIONAL GRANTS**

Queens' also has a variety of grants and bursaries to aid students in pursuing extra-curriculars. This can include for playing sports, musical instrument hire and lessons, and, perhaps most excitingly, travel. These grants and bursaries aren't usually means tested which means that they are available to all students that want them, and they refresh every year, meaning that you can access these funds every year of your degree if you so choose. Individual faculties in college and across the university also tend to have grants and bursaries for things like books or course materials.

### **ACCOMODATION COSTS**

Finding accommodation for university is a major concern for most students, luckily, Cambridge students are **guaranteed accomodation** for the **first three years** of study which is usually the entire undergraduate degree.

In terms of yearly contracts Queens' accommodation is on a "quarterly scheme" where we pay for accommodation for 3 continuous quarters - the 9 month academic year. This means we pay for rooms (and can live in Queens') over the Christmas and Easter vacations, and a few weeks after term. A table with the quarterly accomodation costs for Queens' 2025-26 freshers is provided below. Utilities costs vary as they are metered and subject to market fluctuations however over 2024-25 for a typical Cripps room combined electric and gas costs were around ~£120 for Michaelmas term. Food is typically the biggest other expense with the budget depending on the balance of self-catering, eating in the buttery, and amount of takeaway/formals. Lastly, circuit laundry, bi-weekly housekeeping, and gym use is free at Queens' [as of 2025].

As aformentioned Queens' does not distinguish between catered and self catered with all rooms having a gyp space as well as the option to purchase meals individually from the buttery.

#### Accomodation costs for Queens' 2025-26 Freshers

Incoming freshers will recieve an email following A level results day regarding ranking room preferences and will then recieve an offer of accomodation based on these preferences. As aformentioned students are entitled to three years of guaranteed accomodation and Queens' students do not need to worry about balloting for rooms for the next year until after exams when information will be shared by the JCR regarding the ballot.

### **ACADEMICS**

As in other colleges, Queens' appoints a **Director of Studies** (DoS) for each subject. This is a fellow of the college (an academic member of Queens') who is responsible for the academic development of students in their subject. They will meet with students a couple of times of term for meetings and organise supervisions for students, even if they do not directly teach students through the course. If you get the chance on an open day, talk to a DoS to get the opportunity to understand what studying a certain subject is like in Queens', or any other college.

Your DoS is a key first point of call for any concerns regarding work, coursework, exams or any academic related problems you may encounter. Your DoS wants to help you to succeed and will be there to support you through the challenges that come with the transition to university learning.

### **QUEENS' LIBRARIES**

Queens' has a variety of study spaces spread out across the college to support students academically. This includes a library, study rooms, computer rooms, and a several other spaces!

### **WAR MEMORIAL LIBRARY**

The War Memorial Library is Queens' main library for students. The original chapel, it has three floors, each with a different vibe to fit your mood and all the books you will need during your time as an undergraduate here! The library is open from 7am until 2am, with opening hours extending to 3am during Easter exam term. The War Memorial Library has over 30,000 books and are willing to order any book you need for your course, so our collection is constantly growing! The library also stocks a General Reading section, board games, and DVDs (with a borrowable plug-in DVD player) to help you relax away from your work.





### **QUEENS' OLD LIBRARY**

The Old Library is the original Queens' library from the college's foundation in 1448 with bookcases made from medieval lecterns. Although none of the original collection remains, the library holds a hugely significant collection of over 30,000 early printed books and manuscripts dating from the 12th to 19th century. The Old Library isn't open for students to study in, but it is open for exhibitions and booked visits to view certain manuscripts

### **LIBRARY SERVICES**

### **ONLINE LIBRARY SERVICES**

The university has an online library catalogue that allows you to view all of the books, journals, and articles available across the university, both physically and online. If you want access to an e-book, the Queens' library is able to facilitate this! They can also scan books from their collections if you are at home and want access to a book over the holidays

#### LIBRARY EVENTS

The library runs a variety of events throughout the year. This includes referencing and research workshops for students every term, free tea, coffee, and biscuits every other day during exam term, and Old Library workshops

### OTHER STUDY SPACES AROUND COLLEGE

There are permanent study spaces for students around college. These include a variety of loud and quiet study spaces of varying sizes. This includes a computer study room, bookable conference rooms, the Q Cafe and a loud study space next to our Fitzpatrick Hall that backs onto our rooftop garden! During Easter Exam term, plenty of study spaces open up across both sides of college; this includes our dining hall, various meeting spaces across college, and the lawn outside of plodge!

- Queens' is almost perfectly located on the edge of the city centre, close to the shops, but also to departments, faculties, and green spaces
